reen Legacy Hiroshima (GLH) was established in 2011 to safeguard and spread seeds and saplings of Hiroshima's A-Bombed survivor trees. These seed and saplings have been sent to 130 locations in 40 countries and have in Ashland, Oregon and is dedicated taken root and grown into young trees. In November of 2023, Jim Gersbach from the Oregon Department of Forestry, Mike Oxendine from Oregon Community Trees, and filmmaker David Hedberg visited Hiroshima City and touched the A-bombed mother tree, called Yoji Yamahata.

A documentary film "The Seeds of

Peace" is currently being produced by David Hedberg. He sheds light on Hideko Tamura, who was exposed to the atomic bomb in Hiroshima when she was 11 years old. She now lives to planting seeds and saplings of A-bombed trees, in the United States. GJG and the City of Gresham are honored to care for a Ginkgo biloba second-generation seedling donated through Green Legacy Hiroshima.

nude trees suffer winter storms lanterns feel no cold

Will My Trees Survive?

hen a major storm strikes, some trees seem to be able to come through with only minor damage, while others suffer the loss of large limbs or even sizable parts of the tree.

ASSESSING THE DAMAGE

WAIT AND

SEE: Broken branches on an otherwise healthy tree should survive. Prune the branch back to the next branch to tidy up, and o



to tidy up, and give it a growing season.

GIVE IT TIME:

In most areas, we'd say this tree will probably not recover. But, in the PNW this tree could. Cut



the broken trunk back to the next branch to promote growth. Put it on a 5-year plan and look for the next apex to show itself. **EASY CALL:** A mature tree can survive losing a major limb because more than likely it was already dead and broke away from the collar. Trim back to the trunk. The tree's hormones should be able to repair the large wound left over.

BYE BYE:

Included bark causes weak branching. Consequently, when the branch breaks, it exposes the cambium (greenish

inner bark) where disease and insects will eventually take over.

TORN OR

RIPPED BARK: Carefully use a sharp knife to smooth the ragged edges of wounds where bark has been torn away. Try not to expose any more of the

cambium than is necessary, as these fragile layers contain the tree's food and water lifelines between roots and leaves.



So what can be done before the next storm hits? It's not surprising to GJG to see a reputable source, Tree City USA, state that routine pruning reduces dominant stems from breaking easily and eliminates dead wood that is prone to breaking and falling.

Correct pruning can also reduce wind resistance that is usually responsible for tree damage, too.

If you're in a situation where you need to replace or repair a damaged tree, proper root handling is essential.

POST-STORM INSPECTION

Avoid root cutting within a distance 5x the diameter of the tree



Don't plant too deep and be sure to straighten or cut circling roots.

Proper planting allows roots to grow outward and deep for greater stability.



Be patient. The Pacific Northwest offers a rich and resilient environment for trees to recover.

Growing and Caring for Blueberries, Saturday, March 2nd, 12-1:30pm
