# New Lantern on Tsuru Island



hen our photographer, Bill, is unhappy, volunteers react. Last year we cleaned out the stream bed on Tsuru Island, causing the pond at the entrance to the garden to dry up. The element of water is an important feature of Japanese gardens. In the summer, Bill carries out a hose and manually fills the pond. In the rainy winter, a valve controls the amount of water filling up the pond so the pond doesn't overflow onto the path.

Bill then had another concern. When a visitor walks over the bridge and sees the pond, there is nothing to keep ones eyes from dancing around. Solution: add a statement piece. Thanks to a few volunteers' donations, we were able to purchase a kotoji lantern now installed in historically correct.

We picked this style of lantern because a kotoji lantern is meant to gracefully span a small waterway, a dry creek bed, or other flowing element. Typically, one leg is placed on land and the other in water, reflecting the interdependence of land and water.

Its name kotoji means "harp tuner", for the two legs on which the body of the lantern stands. They resemble tuning forks of the Japanese musical instrument koto.

#### Spring Lawn Maintenance, Saturday, April 13th, 1-2:30pm

**JIM CARD, GJG INSTRUCTOR:** Getting green, healthy grass is not easy without some TLC. This spring's lawn maintenance class will cover keeping your lawn healthy and green throughout the summer months in the northwest weather. It will also cover how to get moss out, what blend of fertilizer works best for lawns and how to apply, an overview of sprinkler systems, and how to water your lawn and your plants.

Creating Pollinator Habitat for your Garden and Home, Saturday, June 15th, 10:30-11:30am

DEB PETERS, GJG INSTRUCTOR AND JUDY ALLERUZZO, AL'S GARDEN & HOME INSTRUCTOR: They will present a seminar full of information about pollinators such as bees, butterflies, moths, and hummingbirds, which are crucial for the reproduction of many plant species. This seminar will focus on native host plants for butterflies and how to create your own pollinator yard. Learn where and how to plant milkweed and other plants to attract monarch butterflies. #### Fundamentals of Pruning, June 8th, 1-2:30pm

**SUE PROTZ, GJG INSTRUCTOR:** Learn the four basic cuts of pruning and the subsequent reaction from these various pruning cuts. Learn also about tools and tool care. Take a tour of the Gresham Japanese Garden to understand the niwakistyle of pruning and how you can attempt it in your own setting.

#### Spring Pruning Hands-on Workshop, Onsite at Vanport International, May 4th, 10am-4pm - \$100

**FRANCHESKA SNYDER, INSTRUCTOR:** Designed for the intermediate pruner looking to advance their knowledge through experiential learning. You will prune a variety of plants and trees dependent on the time of year. The workshop will be limited to 12 participants for an optimal experience. The location is a Japanese garden at Vanport Manufacturing in Boring, Oregon originally designed by Hoichi Kurisu.

Spring Maintenance on Pines: Saturday, May 18th, 12:00pm-2:00pm - \$45 LAURA DUFALA, INSTRUCTOR: Learn all about the why's and how's of pruning and candling pines. Laura will candle, needle, and prune a few pines on Tsuru Island for show and tell. This workshop is in person. Bring your gloves. Laura may turn the class into a collaborative session.

Pruning Laceleaf Maples for Character: Saturday, June 22, 12:30pm-2:30pm - \$45 LINCOLN PROUD, INSTRUCTOR: Many people care for maple trees on their property,

especially laceleaf maples. The class will begin in the GJG Kyoudou Center with a short lecture on the basic botany and growth habits of laceleaf maples, then move to the Japanese garden to learn how pruning is done to various maples and how to apply these principles to your own trees.

#### Hands-on Pruning a Mature Laceleaf Maple, June 29th, 1pm-2:30pm - \$50

For the intermediate pruner. You will have the opportunity to prune beside one of the best pruners in Oregon, Francheska Snyder. On the property of Bateman Carroll in Gresham, OR sits a overgrown, unattended mature laceleaf Acer palmatum. Limited to five students for an optimal pruning experience, you will prune with Francheska to transform this laceleaf back to a beautiful focal point on Powell Blvd. GJG recommends students to participate in the June 22nd laceleaf maple class.







ou know the old saying, timing is everything! Peak cherry blossom blooming is relatively short, and timing peak viewing from year to year is always a moving target for GJG. Weather fluctuations play an important role.

The Gresham Japanese Garden is committed in providing engaging opportunities for the community to enjoy Japanese cultural experiences. Cherry blossom viewing in the daytime and nighttime is a big event in Japan.

The Gresham Japanese Garden has 13 mature Akebono cherry trees in Ebetsu Plaza and adjacent Ambleside Annex. These trees *usually* bloom the end of March into the first week of April. In the daytime, cherry blossom viewing

is called *hanam*i, and in past years GJG has celebrated *hanami* with live entertainment by Oregon Koto Kai. Nighttime viewing of cherry blossoms is called *yozakura*. To celebrate this year's cultural event, the Gresham Japanese Garden is offering a Yozakura Cherry Blossom Festival. We thank the Regional Arts and Cultural Council (RACC) grant for installing the electrical infrastructure into Ebetsu Plaza and Ambleside Annex.

## Oregon Koto Kai will entertain you under the delicate cherry blossoms.

We have two special nights planned to enjoy this ethereal cultural event. Starting March 27th, the tree lights will come on at 7pm and stay on until midnight. Bring a blanket or chair on Saturday, March 30th and Saturday, April 6th, when Oregon Koto Kai entertains you under these delicate blossoms while you sip a cup of tea and enjoy a sakura sweet provided by GJG.
